Accreditation: PRice reviewed next Self-Study background, timing and work groups required and asked LAP members and friends to please consider serving on one of these groups. Only one more meeting this SY – Wed., May 8, 2019, 2-4 p.m. but will resume in the fall; 1st draft of Self-Study due May 2019; entire study must be completed by Dec. 2019 for March 2020 Visit.

KVredenburg asked to be sent an update on what the groups have accomplished to date.

LAP asked to go online and respond to survey (link in agenda above) to assist the school Climate and Community Self-Study Group.

STEAM Program Coordinator Brent Takenouchi provided some personal history; Oahu-born; lived in Japan for a year so is fluent in Japanese; Attended Island Pacific Academy and earned his MA from UH. Most recently taught at Parker School – worked there with Janice English. Excited about opportunity at WMS for more community involvement and outreach and more flexibility. Discussed "Design Thinking" and student empowerment. Is holding a series of miniworkshops to help introduce teachers-staff to new technology. Is working to teach students to be able to teach others how to use various machines – empower them to care for the equipment, take ownership. Also hopes to use this process to teach greater collaboration and become better problem solvers. Working to get Makerspace going too.

Kasem: Urged BTakenouchi to keep communications open with teachers and also asked that he think about what would bring positive attention to the school. Brent agreed; initial focus is to support teachers; also wants to teach students to use the equipment and also to view technology as a means to an end.

Principal's Update: Campus Cash is having a positive impact. Also, Valentine's Dance 2/15/19 was "an eye-opening experience and possibly best thing we've done this year re: attendance." Kids wanted to attend and some families pushed hard to get their child to attend even though they hadn't fulfilled expectations. Admin held the line re: attendance and behavior expectations.



JEnglish will be bringing a proposed Attendance Policy to LAP for discussion; general concept: if a students misses 10 days in a semester, he/she is in jeopardy of securing required credit(s). Must have doctor's excuse if out.

RGremminger challenged that we don't want students coming to school if really sick to protect the health of other kids and faculty-staff. All agreed but JEnglish said more discussion of the details is needed; will bring proposed policy to have this discussion; wants to be fair to families and kids but also needs to make families accountable. May take a year to implement this policy. Currently at 25% Chronic Attendance. Sent out 37 letters last month to families about Chronic Attendance. Only 3 of the families called/followed up.

Mon., 2/11 – 100+ kids absent at WES per MCarvalho – 2/12 was no school and many families took advantage of this. WMS also had high absence rate that day.

JSherwood still thinks WMS needs a crisis counselor to do outreach to families to address attendance as well as other issues. PRice applied for a grant to fund this but not approved. Still looking for funding source – about \$65,000 for a full time position plus expenses.

Discipline: JEnglish reported reduced issues and that students "are reporting." Lessons provided students by both the Principal and in Advisory have had a positive impact.

8th **Grade Ho'ike** – March 7, 5-6:30 p.m.: LAP members and friends urged to come assist teachers with project presentations. 23 class projects – beginning 2/21-3/6. M-T,Th,F from 1:30-2:15 p.m.; Wed 12:30-1:15 p.m. 2nd Floor of STEAM Building. OK to go straight to building and sign in there.

LLobue discussed projects – as important as the US History topics are, this is also about teaching students "The Big Cs": Collaboration, Creativity, Communication, Critical Thinking, Compromise. These are life skills. Also, these projects provide students with an opportunity to make a public presentation of their learning.

Student-Led Transition Night – Wed., March 13, 2019: JEnglish reviewed the plan (see flyer). Will be awarding families who attend (and RSVP) with a drawing for clear backpacks and clear water bottles – both of which Janice hopes to make required for student safety.

Vaping and other health/safety issues: JEnglish said school is planning a Caring Supports for Students & Families Night – Thurs., March 28, 2019, 5-6:30 p.m. Partnering w/ Hamakua Kohala Health Center. Connected to 3/25/19 Teacher PD re: Trauma Informed Schools.
